Kincardine Church Closing Service

THE SERVICE to mark the closing of Kincardine Church had a large congregation on Sunday 13th October. The local school, Gledfield Primary, had their own special Service on Friday before the pupils broke up for their October holidays. This was very fitting as the school was used for Services while the current Church was being built in 1909.

Regular Services were conducted until the end of December 2023 when Kincardine, Croick and Edderton and Creich Church and Dornoch Cathedral were united in a new Union, the Dornoch Firth Church of Scotland on, 1st January 2024.

The Service was led by Interim Moderator for the Dornoch Firth Parish, Rev. Alistair Drummond, and supported by Rev. Carol Anne Porter, Locum Minister for the Dornoch Firth Parish, the Rev Mary Stobo. Amanda Anderson, Highland & Islands Presbytery Support Officer, read the formal Pronouncement of Closing:

"Brothers and sisters in Christ, these buildings of Kincardine Church and Hall, having been blessed and set apart as a place of worship, together with the land on which they stand and all objects remaining in it, we now formally release for whatever future honourable use lies ahead.

"In the name of the Church of Scotland and Presbytery of Cleir Eilean I: Highlands and Hebrides, I declare that at the close of today's worship, this church building will no longer be used by this congregation for regular worship. May it yet be a blessing through its new owners to the people of this community and neighbourhood."

The Rev. Carol Anne Porter led the congregation in the last prayer with the Rev. Drummond closing the final Service in Kincardine Church with the blessing.

It was a historic and emotional occasion with some in attendance who were married, some were baptised and many whose parents had gifted various items to the Church. There was time after the service where the sizeable congregation shared memories with a display of photos as they enjoyed refreshments and the usual quality spread of goodies for which Kincardine are noted.

Margaret then welcomed Carrie MacDonald who is the local fundraiser for Highland Hospice. The Hospice gets some funding from the Highland council but most of its funding comes from local fundraisers throughout the year continually holding events to support the work of the hospice. A large amount comes through their Charity Shops which are very popular

and there is a new café opened at the Hospice in Bishop's Road in Inverness. Margaret thanked Carrie for coming to speak to us and we then enjoyed a welcome cup of tea.

On Tuesday 1st October our meeting was held in The Tea Room in Bonar Bridge Village Hall. Margaret Macrae and Ann Creed led the worship. Our speaker was Gordon Scott from Highlands and Islands Blood Bikes assisted by his colleague Sandy McPhail. The service covers 12,500 sq. miles and is entirely operated by volunteers. Riders transport urgent medical samples, medication and equipment. The four main hospitals they cover are Fort William, Wick, Raigmore and Oban. A truly wonderful service supporting the NHS. £250 was collected that afternoon to give to the cause which had inspired us all. Thank you.

The volunteers all wear orange High viz jackets. Children are also encouraged to keep the beach clean by the provision of plastic gloves and bin bags, with the added incentive of a free ice cream after. Margaret Macrae thanked Isla for a most enjoyable evening.



Looking to next year the Finance Committee are busy pulling together a budget which will help the us determine our target for next year.


The Fundraising Committee are not sitting on their laurels but have already planned for 2025:


Local Donation

The "Pinkie-Col" charity golf event, held in memory of local man Alexander Campbell, has been run for several years, always held the day after the Dornoch Games when many exile Dornoch folk return for the weekend. The entry this year reached maximum numbers with over 80 playing and naturally everyone was dressed in pink. Beneficiaries from the event were ESRA, Beach Wheelchairs and Dornoch Cathedral.

Traditionally the winner gets half the proceeds raised for their chosen charity. Jim Oliver from Rogart, donated the entirety of his winnings to the Cambusavie Unit at the Lawson Memorial Hospital. They were delighted to receive the money which they have put towards the purchase of patient transfer scales. These will make the job of the staff much easier and the patients more comfortable when being weighed and transferred.

When the organisers heard about The Gift Project established by Annie MacDonald and supported by several other Dornoch ladies they decided to include them when distributing the fund raised.
